June 3rd Eichelberger Distillery at Dills Tavern Tour (Dillsburg, PA) 9:00 am At the historic Dills Tavern in Dillsburg, visitors can step back in time at the Eichelberger Distillery, a fully functioning reproduction of an 18th-century whiskey distillery. During the tour, guests learn how early Pennsylvanians turned locally grown grain into rye whiskey using period recipes, wooden fermentation barrels, and wood-fired pot stills. The distillery honors the legacy of the Eichelberger family, who operated a thriving distilling business on the property in the early 1800s, when whiskey production was a major part of the region's economy. Today, the site combines living history with hands on interpretation, allowing visitors to see—and sometimes smell—the process just as it might have looked over two centuries ago. **Cost: \$15.00**

June 4th Virtual Voyager “Galápagos Islands” (Fellowship Room) 1:30 pm The Galápagos Islands are a remote Pacific archipelago famed for unique wildlife, volcanic landscapes, and pivotal insights into evolution inspired by Charles Darwin's groundbreaking observations.

June 5th Dr. Jamie Noerpel “PA Dutch Food” (Fellowship Room) 2:00 pm When the Germans settled York County, they brought customs dating centuries back. However, the flora and fauna in south-central PA forced our ancestors to adapt to the new environment. Behold - the birth of PA Dutch culture. In this presentation, Dr. Jamie Noerpel, will explore the culinary traditions of our grandmothers and grandfathers including raspberry puddin and fastnachts, apple butter, butchering cows and pigs, and of course pickled tripe. However, her favorite thing to make is dandelion wine. Come with your own recipes to add to this story telling afternoon.

June 15th Hershey Gardens & Butterfly Atrium (Hershey, PA) 9:00 am Milton S. Hershey is best-known to the world as the man who gave us HERSHEY'S chocolates and candies. But locally, his record of philanthropy and dedication to his community is his most inspiring legacy. True to form, when Mr. Hershey was approached to sponsor a rosarium in the nation's capital, he declined and instead forged ahead with a project in Hershey that would be accessible to the local community. He famously asked for “a nice little garden of roses,” which started as about 3.5 acres in 1937 and grew to a 23-acre botanical garden over the next 5 years. Enjoy a stroll through these beautiful gardens and check out the Butterfly Atrium, an indoor tropical paradise for a rotating display of hundreds of tropical and North American varieties of butterflies. **Cost: \$15.50**

June 16th Online Lecture: “Honoring D-Day – Echoes of Valor & Victory” (Fellowship Room) 10:00 am On June 6, 1944, the Allies undertook one of the most bold and significant operations of World War II — a massive amphibious and airborne assault in Normandy, marking the beginning of the end for Nazi oppression in Europe. Join us to honor this monumental day with an inspiring online lecture by Dr. Spencer Jones, esteemed historian, and author. - The Latin words 'Sol' and 'Stice' literally mean 'sun' and 'to stand still.'
- The Summer Solstice equates to the longest day and shortest night of the year. There will usually be around 14 hours of sunlight on this day.
- At Stonehenge, the Heel Stone and Slaughter Stone align with the rising sun.
- The ancient Celts celebrated the day with dancing, feasts, parties, and bonfires to increase the sun's energy for good harvests and prosperity.
- While the Northern Hemisphere will be celebrating Summer Solstice the Southern Hemisphere they will be celebrating the Winter Solstice.
- If you jump over a solstice fire, luck will come your way for the rest of the year. Not recommended for residents at Concordia at SpiriTrust. 😊
- Summer Solstice is the height of summer and longest day, but after this day the days will become shorter and nights longer.
- When Christians were converting pagans, they changed the name of the day to “The feast of St John the Baptist”.
- Over 70 countries around the world celebrate Summer Solstice, from Europe to Africa to Australia to the United States to Asia.
